## Classroom News...

#### K/P/1

Kaya! Hello!

We have been busy wondering and investigating all sorts of questions about Australia's Aboriginal culture in an attempt to answer our BIG question...What is special to the Aboriginal people?

So far, we have discovered that family, art, music, animals and Dreamtime stories are very important and this week we have been investigating how food is a big part of Aboriginal culture also. Today we made damper which we shared smothered in Sugarbag (honey) but decided to pass on the witchetty grubs! Our learning centres have been abuzz with dot painting, x-ray art, didgeridoo design, sand symbols and a 'long-term' project which has finally produced a very cool torn-paper Aboriginal flag! We had a lot of fun using our red desert dirt to make ochre and deep red coloured playdough.

In writing we have been learning that a procedure is a set of instructions for someone to follow. We investigated how to throw a boomerang and how didgeridoos are made and wrote instructions to teach others how to do this.

While looking through books and listening to stories in our 'QR code library' we have noticed that traditional Aboriginal people built shelters while camping in the bush. We are wondering how they did this and may just try to make one ourselves!

#### 100 Days of Learning

Last Tuesday we were very excited to finally get to number 100 on our school calendar. Yes, that's right! The students and teachers of St. Joseph's have now enjoyed just over 100 days of learning! Well, that was certainly a reason to celebrate, so KPP1 students invited the Year 2/3s over to join in 100 minutes of fun and discovery.

We have been on a roll this term in Year 5/6! I feel as though we have accomplished a lot in only 3 weeks.

In Religion, we have been looking at appropriate ways we can take control of our emotions and how the way we react to situations can determine whether they will have a good or bad outcome. As a reminder, the students posed for photos which show them acting out each of the five steps, so they have visual prompts to help them.

Students also did a fantastic job with their Mass on Wednesday for the Feast Day of Mary Mackillop. We had some technical difficulties, but the students persevered and read beautifully and conducted themselves well.

During Reading, students have been keeping up with the current headlines by reading news articles. These articles have covered the movement of the earth's magnetic pole, a dolphin adopting a whale calf and even the discovery of previously thought extinct animals and plants. These require the students to read for meaning and they are able to learn about the world around them.

We have also had some teachable moments happen this term with the students becoming curious about topics like, taxation and interest rates! This has sprouted from their Civics & Citizenship unit and will require me to do some extra research myself! It is wonderful to have the Year 5/6 students so engaged and wanting to learn more.

#### An Interview With Miss Charlton

This week, we profile another of our new staff members, Miss Millie Charlton, who is doing an amazing job with her Year 2/3 Class. Recently, Elyssa and Sienna sat down with Miss Charlton to conduct an interview. We hope you enjoy this chance to find out a little bit more about one of the members of our Saint Joes team.

- 1) Why do you think you were hired to work at St. Joseph's?
  Well, I grew up in a country town, a bit like this one but even smaller, so I really like to live in a small town. I think I'm very creative, so that made me appealing to the school. I am new to teaching, so I think I bring a lot of enthusiasm to the school, as it's my first teaching job.
- 2) Please tell us about your professional history; where have you worked aside from Saint Joseph's and what roles have you had?
  - I am a graduate teacher, so this is my first job as a teacher. Before this, I was at University, but I did do some teaching pracs in Perth. The last one I did was at Ursula Frayne, which is a big Catholic school in Victoria Park. I taught Year 4s, which I liked- it was a good school. Then I went to Saint Jerome's in Munster for a prac- I really liked that school, too. Apart from that, I have had different little jobs. I did a lot of babysitting during school, for instance. I worked in a kitchen for a while as well- that involved lots of dishes!
- 3) What professional qualifications do you have? Are you studying anything at the moment, or do you plan to in the future?
  - I am a qualified teacher of course, from Notre Dame University. I have a specialisation in Maths and Religion. I would like to do more study, but maybe in a few years- I need to give myself a bit of a break. I've always loved art, so perhaps I could go back and study some art courses.
- 4) What do you enjoy most about working at St. Josephs?
  I love the community that's involved with the school. Everyone is very nice and welcoming. Especially with me being new to the school, that has made things easier. I really like how everyone gets along and shows respect and kindness to each other. I also love that it's a small school, so you can really get to know everyone really well. I love having my own class now too!
- 5) What are your interests in life outside of St. Joseph's?
  Well, I really enjoy sport. I like to play hockey and netball. I haven't played hockey in a while though- this is my first season of hockey in about five years, I think. I also really enjoy drawing and painting. Sometimes I like cooking- if I'm in the right mood.
- 6) Do you enjoy teaching the Year 2/3 age-group, or would you prefer to teach a different year level?

  I do really love teaching the Year 2/3s- I actually think it is my favourite year level to teach, so that's lucky. But I do enjoy teaching older grades too. I've never taught Year 5/6, so I would like to try that at some stage- I'm sure there would be some different challenges compared to the Year 2/3s. But I do really like teaching the Year 2/3s.
- 7) We know you grew up in the country, near the town of Tammin. How does Tammin compare to Pemberton? I like this question! Tammin is actually a lot smaller. At school, I was the only person in my year level, all the way from Year 2 to Year 7. There is no Catholic school there either and no high school. It's not as pretty as Pemberton- not as many trees and it's a bit hotter! We also don't grow so many cool things on our farms- you guys have avocados and different fruits here, but at home, it's really just wheat. Sometimes sheep too.
