Remembrance Day Reflection

Earlier this week, we celebrated Remembrance Day. On this day, I am always reminded of how lucky we all are to live in this great nation, which many have given their lives to protect. We take for granted so many of the privileges we enjoy in Australia.

I was recently reminiscing about a trip that I took to eastern Africa a few years ago and one particular conversation that I had while there. While visiting the country of Uganda, I took the opportunity to go on a hike through a mountain region for a day, accompanied by a local Ugandan guide. As there was just the two of us spending the day together, I had the opportunity to ask him many questions about his life in Uganda.

Inevitably, the tour guide began to ask me about life in Australia. Like many Ugandans, he had never travelled outside his home country and faced a daily struggle to make a meagre living for himself and his extended family, who all lived together with him in a small shack. Somehow, we got onto the topic of government and welfare programs. I will never forget the look on his face when I explained to him that in our country, the government provides pensions and allowances for the elderly, those unable to work, the unemployed etc. He had a look of utter confusion on his face, saying "so, you're telling me that your Government just gives money to citizens who need it?" This was a concept so foreign to him as a Ugandan-his experience was of a corrupt government that largely leaves people to fend for themselves as best as they can. This was one of many parts of our conversation that made me realise and appreciate, with renewed gratitude, just how fortunate we are in Australia.

So, while we all have challenges in life, we should not forget that we live in a safe country with healthcare, education, clean drinking water, a relative lack of pollution, a democratic government and the list could go on.



We should not forget also those brave men and women who have fought so that we might continue to enjoy these things. I hope you were able to acknowledge these people in a special way on Remembrance Day. May all who have given their life in war rest in peace and may we never forget their sacrifice.

Classroom News...

Year 5/6

The first 5 weeks of Term 4 has flown by in the Year 5/6 classroom. In Week One, we were so busy preparing for Confirmation that we hardly noticed the week come and go.

In Week Two, the students were having a whale of a time at swimming lessons.

Finally, in Week Three, things began to settle down and our normal routine was back. The students started learning about the Gold Rush that began in 1851. This is a really fun topic and we're learning lots about the precious metal, Gold. The students all have so many questions about this rare metal and we love finding out information about this crazy period of time.

Another hot topic in our classroom is explanation texts! We have nearly completed writing our explanations and there are some really interesting topics, such as, how a microwave works, how lightening works and even how a cochlea implant works. I'm certainly going to be finding out some things I didn't know before when I read these!

This is a very bitter-sweet term as its always great to get to the end of the year, but it will be so sad to have our Year 6s leave

I really hope the term slows down a little so we can really enjoy the time left!

Year K/P/1

This term the K/P/1 class has begun developing their green thumbs. Investigating how plants reproduce and how to help make the soil in our gardens healthier.

Our Kindy students have had great delight in watching their tiny sunflower seeds grow. They are now ready to be planted into our garden, we are hoping to see some wonderful sunflowers smiling at us when we return from the long school holidays.

The Pre-primaries and Year Ones have become full on botanical scientists. Each, coming up with their own inquiry about different elements to find out how plants grow or what they need to be able to grow. There have been lots of observations, detailed scientific drawings and journal writings identifying how their seeds or plants have changed and grown. Some predictions have been correct while others haven't, and this has left us to wonder why their inquiry didn't work as expected.

Along with our plant inquiries the students have begun to work out ways that they can recycle and make the soil in gardens healthier. They have worked out that worms help keep the soil healthy and some composting worms can turn our scraps into food for plants. We have got up close and personal with some earthworms, before building a new home for the worms. The children are now busy making sure that the scraps from fruit time are cut up small and fed to these very hungry worms.
