NAIDOC Week

NAIDOC Week is a celebration of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and a chance to acknowledge their history, culture and achievements. In recent years, there has been a strong push for schools to have an increased focus on actively supporting the journey of Reconciliation in Australia. Usually held in July, NAIDOC Week for 2020 has been postponed to this week, November 8th-15th. The theme for NAIDOC 2020 is 'Always Was, Always Will Be'. We will celebrate NAIDOC Week as a school by flying the Aboriginal flag, as well as by students participating in a couple of hours of activity rotations, each with a theme linked to the NAIDOC message.

How to Develop Cultural Competency

Here at Saint Joseph's, we have had a particular focus on developing the 'cultural competency' of our staff, who will then be in a better position to develop cultural competency in our students.

So, what is cultural competency, I hear you ask? One useful definition could be as follows:

Cultural competence is the ability to understand, communicate with and effectively interact with people across cultures. Cultural competence encompasses:

- being aware of one's own world view
- developing positive attitudes towards cultural differences
- gaining knowledge of different cultural practices and world views
- developing skills for communication and interaction across cultures.

Certainly, we are more likely to be successful in our quest to increase the cultural competence of our students with your support at home.

So, I encourage you to be proactive in speaking to your children about the fact that we have so many different cultures in Australia, each with their own unique set of beliefs and practices. Encourage them to learn about other cultures and to be proactive in including people of other cultures into their circle of friends. Remind them that just because someone looks different or has different habits or values, it doesn't mean that they are in any way inferior- they are just different to you. This leads to a rich diversity of society, which is something we can all celebrate.
